TECHNOLOGY-ASSISTED FRAUD AND PROTECTION METHODS







The rapid advancement of technology has led to more complex and sophisticated fraud methods. Today, fraudsters are finding new ways to deceive their victims by using various technologies to access personal and financial information. Understanding how technology is used in fraud, particularly the role of Artificial Intelligence (AI)-generated fake images, and what individuals should pay attention to in order to protect themselves from these threats is crucial for preventing such damages and raising awareness.

AI-Generated Fake Images

Artificial intelligence has started to be used in the creation of fake images, adding a new dimension to fraud. Al-generated fake images are often used on social media platforms or fake news sites to attract users' attention. These images may depict an event or situation as real, leading users to click on related links. Clicking on these links can redirect users to fake sites where personal information may be stolen. To protect against such frauds, it is important to verify the source of the images you encounter and be cautious of suspicious content. Additionally, avoid clicking on links from unknown or unreliable sources.

QR Code Fraud

QR codes are a technology we frequently encounter in daily life, providing quick and practical access to information. However, fraudsters exploit this technology by creating fake QR codes to redirect users to seemingly trustworthy fake websites. These sites aim to steal personal information or install malicious software on users' devices. To protect yourself from QR code fraud, it is important to check the reliability of the source of the QR code before scanning it. Avoid scanning QR codes from unknown or suspicious locations and refrain from using QR codes from unfamiliar individuals. Additionally, carefully examine the URL of the website the QR code directs you to and check its reliability.

Phishing Attacks

Phishing is one of the most common methods used by fraudsters. These attacks are typically carried out via email, SMS, or fake websites. Users unknowingly provide their passwords, credit card information, or other personal details by responding to messages that they believe come from legitimate institutions. To protect against phishing attacks, verify the authenticity of the sender of emails and messages, avoid clicking on suspicious links, and confirm the source before sharing personal information.

Social Engineering

Social engineering is the process by which fraudsters manipulate their victims into providing information or performing specific actions. Fraudsters often create a sense of urgency or gain trust to force their targets into hasty decisions. To protect against such frauds, verify the identity of the other party before sharing information and avoid making decisions under high pressure.

Cryptocurrency Frauds

With the increasing popularity of cryptocurrencies, fraud activities in this area have also become widespread. Methods such as fake ICOs, Ponzi schemes, or fake wallets are used to steal users' cryptocurrencies. To protect yourself from cryptocurrency frauds, thoroughly research the project and its developers before investing and use only reputable and well-known platforms. Often, fraudsters first hijack real social media accounts and make posts using these compromised accounts.

Conclusion and Evaluation

Technology has diversified and complicated the methods used in fraud. To cope with new threats such as AI-generated fake images, it is essential to be vigilant and take security measures. Using strong passwords, applying two-factor authentication (2FA), keeping up with updates, and being informed about fraud are fundamental steps to enhance your security in the digital world. While technology makes our lives easier, it also poses serious risks if not approached with caution. Therefore, it is crucial to act carefully and consciously in the digital world.

Successful application of individual protection measures will also enhance societal awareness. Additionally, public awareness is significantly strengthened by official institutions and organizations, with the Cyber Crime Unit established within the General Directorate of Security (Emniyet Genel Müdürlüğü) playing a key role in creating and developing public awareness.



What Should Investors Consider When Choosing a Brokerage House?

In recent years, the increase in the diversity of investment instruments due to financial globalization and the fact that investment processes are faster and easier than in the past can lead to an increase in the number of individual investors. On the other hand, in countries where inflation is high, it is possible to observe an increasing number of people trying to protect their savings against inflation through various investments. In fact, individual investors can now open positions on variables such as stocks, mutual funds, crypto assets, foreign exchange, commodities, stock market index, EFT, bonds and certificates quickly and with a single order. In this context, in the financial world where diversity is increasing, not only diversity but also risks are increasing, while the most important risk that is ignored in the financial world, which includes numerous risks, can be expressed as the risk of brokerage house. The market, where foreign exchange, commodities and even stock market indices are traded, can be considered as the environment that requires the most attention when choosing a brokerage house. Although the FOREX (Foreign Exchange) market, which allows leveraged transactions with high volatility, has been one of the most popular markets for the last two decades, it was not subject to initial margin and leverage restrictions until 10.07.2017. This situation caused individual investors to lose a lot of money, and many investors even lost their principal. On 10.07,2017, the official gazette published the following statements: "In order to perform leveraged transactions, a minimum of 50,000 TL or equivalent foreign currency amount shall be deposited in the account as initial margin amount." and "The leverage ratio to be applied at the time the position is first opened in leveraged transactions cannot exceed 10:1." This restricted the ability of individual investors to perform highly leveraged transactions with low amounts. The main purpose of this is, of course, to protect individual investors. However, over time, the emergence of brokerage houses that are not subject to the CMB, allowing anyone to trade at any amount, as well as the provision of 1:100, 1:200, 1:300, 1:400, and 1:500 leverage opportunities, has caused individual investors to switch to brokerage houses that are not subject to the CMB. Although audits are carried out by the competent authorities, individual investors, especially new investors who have just started trading, may prefer to trade in unauthorized brokerage houses operating in different countries where there are no limitations such as leverage and initial capital.

Despite efforts to raise investor awareness through social media, mainstream media, newspapers and free trainings, unfortunately, domestic investors may trade with unauthorized brokerage houses instead of brokerage houses subject to the CMB. Although these institutions state that they operate in the UK, Montenegro, Cyprus and other countries and that they are audited by the official institutions of the countries in which they operate, they cause investors to face two different risk factors. The first risk is the risk of losing even the principal due to the lack of leverage and initial capital limitations, while the second risk is the risk of the brokerage firm. While the first risk factor can be minimized with orders such as stop loss and take profit, the second risk, broker risk, is impossible to avoid. The main reason for this is that the intermediary institution is not audited by the CMB. In this case, the brokerage firm may not return the profit or even the principal if the investor makes a profit. If the investor encounters this situation, he/she should file a complaint and request to the CMB, but since the institution operates abroad and is not audited by the CMB, the investor will be defrauded in a way.

To explain with an example; let's assume that an investor trades with \$10,000 through an institution that is not subject to the CMB. As a result of the trades, the investor made a 40% return within a month and when he wanted to withdraw all of his money, i.e. \$14,000, he could not find an interlocutor and faced the situation of losing all of his principal and profit. This would disappoint the investor even more than the loss incurred on the trade, which would reduce the investor's appetite for trading. In this context, in order to avoid falling into the trap of (so-called) brokerage houses, all investors should work with brokerage houses authorized by the CMB. Otherwise, all their assets, including the capital they have invested, may be lost by being defrauded and it may become impossible to reach any interlocutor to compensate for this situation.


ON THE RAPID DEVELOPMENT OF LNG TRADE IN THE WORLD

The ever-increasing global energy demand, irrational policies in international relations, old-fashioned land wars, the pandemic, the rise of authoritarian tendencies in governments, and irregular migration all make borders more significant. These experiences in recent years have caused problems in securing energy supply, affecting both economies and disrupting modern life. In this context, liquefied natural gas (LNG) emerges as an alternative that allows countries to pursue a relatively independent energy policy. The dependency on natural gas supplied via pipelines makes it difficult for countries to conduct independent energy policies, and, as in the case of Russia shutting down gas pipelines to Europe for various reasons, reminds us who is in charge.

LNG is the liquid form of natural gas. This gas is cooled to -162°C, reducing its volume by 600 times. After being transported by LNG ships, it is regasified through energy terminals to provide energy. Therefore, having an appropriate energy infrastructure, access to the sea, neighboring coastal countries, and rivers connected to sea transportation offer significant advantages in this regard.

According to the 2024 report of the International Gas Union, the world's top five LNG exporters by share are the United States (21%), Australia (20%), Qatar (19%), Russia (8%), and Malaysia (7%). The top five LNG importers by share are China (18%), Japan (16%), South Korea (11%), India (5%), and France (5%).



The figure above illustrates the global trend of natural gas trade via interregional pipelines and LNG terminals between 2013 and 2023. Although interregional natural gas trade fluctuated during the period in question, gas trade via LNG terminals increased each year compared to the previous one and surpassed the trade conducted via interregional pipelines starting in 2020.

Recent experiences show that the world is becoming an increasingly insecure place, which endangers the security of energy supply, essential for the continuity of modern life. Natural gas trade via pipelines can be turned into a threat by the country that owns the gas. In this respect, LNG offers an advantage for countries to pursue a relatively independent energy policy, and it is becoming a subject of increasing trade with each passing day.

CLIMATE CHANGE AND GLOBAL FOOD INFLATION

Climate change, which is seen as one of the biggest challenges of the 21st century, is taking its place as one of the important research topics not only for environmental scientists but also for economists. I can almost hear you saying, how can an environmental problem be an economic problem? However, the problems caused by climate change are actually most closely intertwined with economics.

In recent years, economists have accelerated their research on the macroeconomic effects of climate change. One of the most important questions on everyone's minds is how climate change will affect food inflation. A joint study by climate scientists and the European Central Bank (ECB) titled "The impact of global warming on inflation: averages, seasonality and extremes" is on this very subject. The study, which examined monthly price indices for 121 countries since 1996, concluded that there has been a steady increase in food prices and inflation as temperatures increase. The results of the study signaled that food inflation will increase by 4 percent in some parts of the world by 2060 and that food costs could increase by 1.5 to 1.8 percent annually until 2035. The study emphasizes that if carbon emissions do not decrease, the severity of the situation will increase even more in 2060, and that limiting future global warming and inflationary effects will become even more difficult.

Another study is the "Sustainability of Agricultural Supply Under the Impact of Climate Change" report prepared by scientists from Boğaziçi University with the support of the Turkish Industrialists' and Businessmen's Association (TÜSİAD). According to this report, each degree Celsius increase in global average temperature can reduce wheat land yield by 6%. In addition, according to the report, it is estimated that price increases due to climate change will reach 84% on a product basis.

Turkey is one of the countries whose food production will be negatively affected by climate change. According to a study, when considering the product yields in Turkey in 2050, there will be a 13% decrease in rice, 12% in corn, 10% in sugar beet, 8% in wheat, barley, rye and oats, 7% in sunflower, 7% in legumes (dried beans, chickpeas, green and red lentils) and 3% in cotton. The decreases in production volumes signal that costs will increase both domestically and internationally and that the low-income and poor classes will be affected the most.

The food problem caused by climate change will unfortunately affect the poor the most with the increase in food prices. This can lead to further deterioration in income distribution and diseases caused by malnutrition. The solution to the problem is again through economics. It will be possible by renewing itself with appropriate policies and adapting to climate change and mitigation.


One of the professions expected to be in demand in the future is that of a cyber city analyst. A cyber city analyst is an expert who examines the digital infrastructure of smart cities, managing security, data management, and optimization processes in urban environments.

Venice Film Festival Awards Announced, Palestinian Protests Left Their Mark on the Festival

Awards were presented at the Venice Film Festival, one of the most important festivals along with Cannes and Berlin. The Golden Lion, the grand prize at the 81st Venice Film Festival, was won by Spanish director Pedro Almodovar's latest film The Room Next Door. The festival jury, chaired by Isabelle Huppert, chose Vermiglio by Maura Delpero for the Grand Jury Prize. The Best Director award went to Brady Corbet for his film The Brutalist.

Haluk Bilginer and Nicole Kidman in the Same Film

One of the standout films of the festival was Babygirl, starring Haluk Bilginer and Nicole Kidman. Kidman received a long standing ovation for her performance in the film, and also won the Best Actress award this year.

The Best Actor award at the festival went to French actor Vincent Lindon for his role in The Quiet Sun.

Support for Palestine in the Award Speech

While the Berlin Film Festival, which took place in the first months of the year, was blacked out on everything related to Palestine, the opposite was true in Venice. It was particularly striking that some award-winning filmmakers included Palestine in their award speeches.

American Jewish director Sarah Friedland, who received the "Lion of the Future" award at the festival, condemned Israel and expressed solidarity with the Palestinian people. Friedland accepted her award with the words, "I accept this award on the 336th day of Israel's genocide in Gaza and the 76th day of the occupation of Palestine. I believe that it is our duty as directors to use the institutional platforms we work on to ensure that Israel is held accountable in the global arena. I stand in solidarity with the Palestinian people's struggle for freedom."



When Nietzsche Cries

You must be ready to burn yourself with your own flame:

How can you be new without first becoming ashes?

Thus Spoke Zarathustra'

When Nietzsche Wept is a novel by psychiatrist Yalom, published for the first time in 1992, which deals with fiction and reality together...

With this novel, the author focuses on Nietzsche's life and thoughts with 'Talking Therapies' and turns our eyes to 19th century Vienna on the eve of the birth of psychoanalysis. Sigmund FREUD, Josef BREUER, Lou Andreas SALOME, who are important figures in the historical process, take place as supporting characters in the book.

When we look at the plot of the book, we see that Nietzsche, who cannot face his own pain and illness and denies them, stands at the center of the events. After a while, Lou Salome mediates the encounter between Josef Breuer and Nietzsche in the plot. The reason for this is that Salome believes that no one other than Breuer can help Nietzsche.

After the encounter, the plot of the novel begins to revolve around Breuer and Nietzsche. With Breuer's 'Talking Therapies' with Nietzsche, we begin to accompany the characters on our own inner journey, searching for solutions to our existential problems, how and why.

On the one hand, we, as readers, let ourselves flow in dialogues that question life, and on the other hand, we witness history in the Vienna of the 19th century.

What is it like to look at the world through the eyes of a criminal? In a world where everything is perceived by most people, even by ourselves, as flat as it seems to be, where we think that everything flows on a moral plane, for better or worse... Of course there is a fiction of political and economic forces, but what about the fiction of criminals, their view and design of the world?



Blacklist gives us the background of criminal behavior and logic from the minds of the criminals, in an extraordinarily action-packed and fast-paced narrative. In the first five to ten minutes, this series takes you inside the minds of dozens of criminals of different types. The series starts at the very beginning with Raymond Reddington (James Spader), who is at the top of the FBI's most wanted list, surrendering himself to the FBI, and continues with Reddington's request for a newly graduated profiler. Over time, the series continues with the establishment of a special and secret unit within the FBI, which Reddington advises and sometimes directs in terms of his own interests. For ten seasons, the series brings you closer to the criminals' perspectives on the world; it also makes you question concepts such as law, order, truth and justice from time to time.

While the series focuses on the events, the criminal characters and their behavior, it also takes Reddington and his relationship with his chosen profiler as a sub-story, a puzzle, a mystery or a puzzle until the end. Highly recommended for those who want to watch something different, clever and fast-paced.

THE TRANSPARENCY SOCIETY

In modern society, is freedom preserved through unlimited transparency or through privacy? In *The Transparency Society* (2020), Byung-Chul Han examines the pursuit of transparency in modern society and its social impacts through profound critical archaeology. According to Han, making everything visible turns into a form of surveillance that threatens freedom and privacy, keeping individuals under constant observation. "*Transparency*,..." Han states, "*turns people into glass. Its violence lies in this. Unrestricted freedom and communication turn into total control and surveillance. Social media increasingly resembles digital panopticons that discipline and exploit sociality..." (2020:12). While transparency creates an illusion of freedom, it actually binds individuals with invisible chains, making them constantly monitored and controlled. Consequently, individuals lose their freedom by being perpetually visible and scrutinized.*

The Society of Positivity

Rather than enhancing access to information, transparency leads to a social order where individuals are constantly observed and evaluated. Han conceptualizes this as a "society of positivity." In such a society, only the positive, agreeable, and measurable hold value: "The general judgment of the society of positivity is the 'Like.' Facebook's determination not to offer a 'Dislike' option is significant. The society of positivity avoids all forms of negativity because they would disrupt communication. The only criterion of communication's value is the volume and speed of information exchange" (2020:23). Han argues that in this social order, critical thinking and differences are replaced by a harmonious, homogeneous form of communication. Interactions between individuals become superficial, and social relationships continue in a depthless manner.


Privacy in the Shadow of Transparency

Han asserts that transparency is a byproduct of the information society and has become indispensable for sustaining the capitalist order. "The excess of exposure makes everything immediately consumable, stripped of all its secrets," says Han (2020:28). He emphasizes that although transparency accelerates information and communication, thereby increasing efficiency, it also creates a competitive environment that wears down individuals. The pursuit of transparency damages not only information but also human relationships, ethical values, and the political structure. In this context, Han reminds us of the importance of privacy for modern individuals: "The human soul, as far as can be seen, needs spaces where it can remain away from the gaze of others, to be alone. It has the characteristic of being impermeable. Complete illumination will lead to its burning and a kind of burnout" (2020:17). Therefore, Han argues that the protection of privacy is vital for the individual's mental health and the sustainability of social cohesion.

Final Thoughts

The central argument in Han's *The Transparency Society* is that the concept of transparency homogenizes everything by making it transparent, resulting in a bland, competitive, and exhausting social structure devoid of magic and depth. The book aims to give the reader a strong awareness of the invisible threats of modern society by exploring in depth the pressure on individuals in the digital age, the erosion of privacy and the superficial communication that has replaced critical thinking.

ASSESSMENT OF UNESCO'S 2023 GLOBAL EDUCATION MONITORING REPORT

The 2023 Global Education Monitoring report by UNESCO has sparked significant debates regarding the global call to ban smartphone use in schools, focusing on its effects on educational policies and students' academic performance. The report highlights research on the role of smartphones in education, revealing that these devices negatively impact learning processes by distracting students, leading to poor academic outcomes. Furthermore, the report emphasizes the detrimental effects of excessive screen time on children's emotional stability.

The Distractive Effect of Smartphones

As the role of technology in education continues to grow, the use of smartphones in schools has become a contentious issue. Research shows that smartphones have a high potential to distract students during lessons. When students turn to their phones during class, they struggle to concentrate, interrupting their learning process. UNESCO's report observes negative outcomes in classrooms where phones are frequently used, such as decreased concentration and academic achievement. The report stresses that excessive use of smartphones directly impacts academic success. Continuous use of phones weakens study habits and prevents students from reaching their academic goals. Spending time on phones during lessons or free periods can cause students to neglect their assignments and studies, ultimately resulting in poor academic performance in the long term.

The Impact of Screen Time on Emotional Stability

The report also addresses the negative effects of excessive screen time on children's emotional stability. Prolonged screen use reduces children's social interactions, negatively affecting their emotional development. Additionally, increased screen time disrupts children's sleep patterns, which in turn adversely impacts their overall mood. UNESCO notes that these negative effects spill over into educational processes, diminishing children's motivation to learn.

UNESCO's global call to ban smartphone use in schools serves as a crucial warning that education policies need to be reshaped. The report emphasizes that governments and educational institutions must develop policies that encourage students to use technology consciously. Moreover, teachers and parents are urged to take a more active role in monitoring and limiting children's technology use.

In summary, the warnings highlighted in UNESCO's 2023 Global Education Monitoring report demonstrate the need for a cautious approach to technology use in education. Uncontrolled smartphone use can negatively affect students' academic success and harm their emotional development. Therefore, it is crucial to reevaluate educational policies based on these realities and take the necessary measures. UNESCO's global call underscores the importance of limiting and raising awareness about technology use to improve the quality of education.

BIOMIMICRY

The concept of biomimicry, derived from the Greek words 'bios' and 'imitation' (Volstad and Boks, 2012; Akkaya and Yazıcı, 2020), was used by Otto Schmitt in 1957 (Zorica et al., 2015). Biomimicry, which is inspired by nature (Benyus, 1997), is used to make innovative designs and find solutions to people's problems by taking the biological and characteristic features of many living things. Self-cleaning fabrics inspired by the lotus flower, adhesives inspired by the lizard's feet, drones inspired by the way eagles fly from one place to another in search of food, Speedo's swimsuits inspired by shark skin, and the kingfisher bird inspiring the Shinkansen 500 bullet train are some examples of biomimicry (Yazıcı, 2020). Leonardo Da Vinci, who lived during the Renaissance period, designed tanks by imitating the durability of turtles' shells in order to protect Roman soldiers from arrows shot at them during the war, which are among Da Vinci's best-known designs today (Genç, 2013).

"Biomimicry is a new science for problem solving that examines the models, systems, formation processes and elements of nature and utilizes the information obtained by imitating or taking creative inspiration". Its basic principle is not how we can solve our problems better, but how we can do better. In order to solve our problems or meet a need, we can examine and observe living things in nature and transform them into designs (Primlani, 2013).

Biomimicry is used in two ways. The first is from biology to design and the second is from design to biology. Biomimicry can also be defined as "a practice that learns and tactics strategies found in nature to solve human design challenges and find hope along the way". Biomimicry is an approach that brings together the two worlds of interdisciplinary approaches such as nature and technology, life and design, and biology and innovation (Volstad and Boks, 2012). Its aim is to adapt well-designed products, processes and policies to the physical world (Hayes et al., 2020). Benyus (2011) further argued that "at its most practical, biomimicry is a way of seeking sustainable solutions by borrowing the blueprints, chemical recipes and ecosystem strategies of life". Moreover, "at its most transformative, it brings us into right relationship with the rest of the natural world" (Hayes et al., 2020). Biomimicry aims to better understand the successful strategies adopted by nature to better adapt organisms to life, and then mimic and apply such strategies to solve human problems. To better understand what biomimicry is about and how it differs from other bio-inspired approaches, it is important to understand what biomimicry is not.

ANIMALS AS DIPLOMATS: P.S.: CATS

Public diplomacy has become one of the most popular concepts in international diplomacy in recent years. Referred to as "soft power," public diplomacy is based on a dialogue-centered approach, distinct from coercion, force, or military and economic sanctions. Rather than focusing on agreements and diplomatic activities conducted between governments or other official national institutions, public diplomacy refers to activities aimed at shaping a positive image of a country in the minds of other nations' publics, fostering sympathy, or elevating an already favorable perception. For instance, activities to promote a country's music culture—whether financed by governments or non-governmental organizations or carried out voluntarily—fall under cultural diplomacy, a type of public diplomacy. While cultural diplomacy is sometimes treated as a separate domain in the literature, Turkish folk music, Cuban salsa, or Italian opera can be considered examples of music diplomacy, a subfield of cultural diplomacy.

But is it possible to talk about a type of diplomacy called animal diplomacy? The literature on the subject is scarce, but we can easily associate many countries with certain animals. For example, pandas come to mind when we think of China, camels for Arabia, kangaroos for Australia, and the brown bear for Russia. A famous photo of Russian President Vladimir Putin riding a horse was even turned into a meme online by replacing the horse with a brown bear. In recent years, animals like Larry, the official cat at Buckingham Palace employed to control mice, have frequently appeared in news stories, on websites, and on social media.

In terms of animal diplomacy, Turkey has great potential globally. Although Turkish epics portray the wolf as a sacred myth, Turkey is becoming increasingly known as the "country of cats," and Istanbul as the "capital of cats." You may have even seen the expression "catstanbul" used for Istanbul. Scientific studies also provide evidence that cats originated in Turkey.

Gli, the cat of Hagia Sophia Mosque who passed away in 2020, was one of Turkey's internationally famous cats. Others include Tombili, who passed away in 2016 and now has a statue in Kadıköy, and the obese cat of Beşiktaş, who passed away in February. Tourists' interest in stray cats in Turkey is growing, and the care that locals show for cats in nearly every neighborhood in Istanbul—along with the presence of cat houses and food bowls on almost every street—both surprises and delights visitors.

While Istanbul has become a favorite among tourists and even world-famous influencers due to its cats, it's important not to overlook the city's stray dogs. A quick search online reveals famous street dogs such as Boji, The Boulder, and Kaya. Like the cats, these dogs capture tourists' attention with their sociable nature, their happy lives in secure areas such as Beşiktaş, Kadıköy, and Şişli, and their friendliness. These stray dogs, who can roam freely and safely and are monitored by municipal veterinary services, pose no threat and instead bring joy to both locals and tourists in Istanbul.

Experts agree that showing affection and care toward stray animals is beneficial for psychological well-being. Beyond its societal impact, animal diplomacy should also be considered from an international perspective, and decisions regarding stray animals should be made thoughtfully and compassionately. Turkey's potential to use animal diplomacy as a tool to improve its national image, enhance positive perceptions, and create goodwill internationally should not be overlooked, and approdiplomatic policies should be developed with this in mind.





TECHNOLOGY ADDICTION

Technology addiction is defined as behavioral disorders that occur as a result of the uncontrolled use of the internet and technology available to us. These behavioral disorders include the disorder of playing digital games, playing on gambling sites that also exist on digital platforms, and spending too much time on social media and smartphones and their excessive use.

Digital game addictions in adolescents and young people are on the rise in our country. In digital game addictions, it is seen that young people cannot keep track of their gaming time. Again, while spending time with digital games within the framework of this addiction, lack of interest in other activities in the flow of life is also noticeable. During the time spent playing games, there is not enough emotional satisfaction and they feel psychologically deprived. In short, there is the fact that playing games, whether online or offline, has taken a primary place in the lives of young people and adolescents who are addicted to digital game addiction.

It has been reported that the risk of gambling addiction increases when money is involved in the games played especially in adults and that they can transition to gambling addiction. Internet gambling addiction is included under gambling disorder; however, the rate of internet addiction among adolescents and young people with internet gambling addiction was found to be %30.3.

So what can be done?

In the Turkish Combating Addiction (TBM) Training Program, the Green Crescent has specified the duration of use according to age ranges:

- 0-3 years: Keep away from the screen as much as possible.
- 3-6 years: Total daily time is 20-30 minutes at most.
- 6-9 years: Daily total time is 40-50 minutes at most.
- 9-12 years: Total daily time is 60-70 minutes at most.
- 12+ years: Total time per day maximum 120 minutes.

It is possible to prevent this addiction by complying with the usage times determined by the Green Crescent, supporting our adolescents and young people to meet more with their friends in the social environment, preparing activity plans within the family and directing them to the sports fields that our young people are interested in.

What Can Be Done to Protect Mental Health?



The popular Belgian city of Bruges, which welcomes millions of tourists every year with its medieval architecture and historical atmosphere, is facing serious problems due to over-tourism. Increasing complaints from both locals and authorities show that the quality of life and cultural identity of the city are under threat.

Although Bruges is globally recognized as a UNESCO World Heritage Site, this popularity is now creating difficulties for locals. The rapid increase in the number of tourists is negatively affecting the daily life of the city. Locals are complaining about overcrowded streets, rising rent prices and increasing infrastructure pressures in the city. The uncontrolled growth of tourism, especially in the last few years, risks damaging the historical fabric of the city.

Bruges Mayor Dirk De Fauw announced that some arrangements will be made for the city to cope with this crisis. "We have to control the flow of tourists to preserve Bruges' historical and cultural heritage. Otherwise, the city's unique identity and the quality of life of local people will be seriously damaged," he said.

Bruges authorities are working on various strategies to alleviate the problems created by excessive tourism. These include limiting the number of entrances to the city center, increasing the number of professional tour guides guiding groups of tourists, and promoting alternative routes to reduce tourist density in certain areas. In addition, Bruges has banned the construction of new hotels in the city center and stopped licenses for short-term rental houses in order to mitigate the effects of overtourism. These measures aim to limit the number of overnight tourists and prevent rising housing prices through platforms such as Airbnb. The difficulties of locals finding housing and the changing character of the city played an important role in these decisions.

Bruges is not the only city struggling with overtourism. Many European cities are taking various measures to deal with similar problems. Barcelona is introducing strict controls on short-term rentals, Venice is discussing limiting tourist arrivals, and Lisbon is trying to solve the housing problem of locals by restricting rentals. These steps are part of a wider trend across Europe to improve the quality of life for locals while preserving the economic benefits of tourism.


While tourist interest in Bruges is expected to continue, authorities emphasize the importance of sustainable tourism. The steps to preserve cultural heritage and improve the quality of life of local residents are intended to make the city more livable for both tourists and residents.

CHILDHOOD IN THE MUSEUM:

THE ISTANBUL TOY MUSEUM

The story of the Istanbul Toy Museum begins with a black-and-white circumcision photo of Sunay Akın taken when he was five years old. During the photo session, a toy ship was placed in his hand, and after the photo was taken, the toy was taken away. This small toy symbolizes the beginning of Sunay Akın's journey into collecting toys. After years of searching, Akın decided to establish this museum. Over 20 years, toys collected from all around the world are displayed in the museum. Additionally, the toy ship from the circumcision photo is one of the key pieces in the collection. The toys include various pieces acquired from antique shops, won at auctions, or donated by individuals wishing to contribute to the museum.

The Istanbul Toy Museum was established on April 23, 2005, by Sunay Akın in a historic mansion in Erenköy. This white mansion, which belongs to Akın, provides an excellent setting for the museum's toy collections. Showcasing examples of toy history from the 1700s to the present, this museum is Turkey's first toy museum. The success of the Istanbul Toy Museum has inspired the creation of similar museums in other cities; with Sunay Akın's contributions, the Antalya Toy Museum opened in 2011 and the Gaziantep Toy Museum in 2013.

The museum is closed on Mondays and is open to visitors from 09:30 to 18:00 on weekdays, and from 09:30 to 19:00 on weekends. The entrance fee is 15 TL for adults, with discounted tickets available for 12 TL. It is also worth noting that a typical visit to the museum generally takes around 2-3 hours.

The Istanbul Toy Museum primarily appeals to adults rather than children. Visitors greatly enjoy seeing old toys that bring back childhood memories. It is quite likely that they will reminisce, saying things like, "Oh, I had this toy too!"

If you find yourself in Erenköy, it is recommended to visit the Toy Museum to see various toys and relive your childhood.



Katmer is one of the most traditional and unique desserts in Turkish cuisine. Among the renowned sweet treats of Gaziantep, such as baklava and şöbiyet, katmer stands out as one of its most iconic flavors. This beloved Turkish dessert is prepared with thinly rolled dough, generous amounts of clotted cream, pure butter, beet sugar, and Antep pistachios. Traditionally served to newlyweds on the morning after their wedding, katmer holds a special place in Turkish culinary culture. Over time, this delicious treat has transcended its role in special occasions, becoming a widely consumed dessert.

The history of katmer dates back to the Ottoman era when it was traditionally served at breakfasts or during gatherings to honor guests. While it is particularly popular in Gaziantep, this delicacy has spread to many regions of Turkey over time. Made by filling the thin dough with a generous amount of Antep pistachios, clotted cream, and sugar, katmer offers a delightful combination of crispy and rich flavors. Crafting katmer requires great skill, especially when rolling the dough to its signature thinness. The filled dough is folded into a square shape and baked for about 8-10 minutes. The result is a dessert that is crispy on the outside, soft on the inside, and packed with the rich taste of pistachios.

Its pairing with tea is a testament to how beloved this dessert remains in contemporary culture. For both foreign and local sweet lovers, katmer offers an ideal introduction to exploring the richness of Turkish cuisine.

For those looking to try authentic katmer in Istanbul, there are several notable spots to visit. One of the best places to try this taste is Güllüoğlu in Karaköy, known for its dedication to Gaziantep's culinary traditions. Another great option is Katmerci Zekeriya Usta, a famed Gaziantep katmer maker with a branch in Ataşehir. Other recommended locations include Çanak Kebap & Katmer in Kadıköy, Köşkeroğlu Katmer in Beyoğlu, Develi Baklava in Fatih, and Kilikya Katmer in Ümraniye—each a popular stop for katmer enthusiasts. I highly recommend enjoying this treat with a warm cup of tea.
